continued from p. 1, by Director Marla Gilmore A very rare giant frog was seen in Tecolote Canyon. Wait a minute-upon closer investigation, this is not a rare giant frog after all. It is a very common dog poop bag that was left in the canyon. The San Diego Municipal Code requires you to pick up after your dog which also includes throwing the poop bag in the trash. I must say that as a dog owner I have been guilty of placing a filled bag somewhere along my walk if it isn't convenient to carry with me. On the rare occasion when this happens I always take the same path back and dispose of the bag in the trash. I usually pick up poop left by others whether it is bagged or not. Leaving plastic bags on the trail is bad for the environment since bags take years and years to decompose. No one wants to step in poop or have their dog roll around in it. It is every dog owners responsibility to scoop the poop. Thanks for your cooperation in helping park staff to maintain clean safe trails for all!
